

FOUNDER

Armenta Adams Hummings

ARMENTA ADAMS HUMMINGS is the mother of the Gateways Music Festival, Inc. A crtically-acclaimed concert pianist and holder of bachelor and master's degrees from The Juilliard School, Ms. Hummings founded the festival in 1993 in Winston Salem, N.C. The festival is a classical music celebration that features performances by African-American muscians as well as works written by African-American composers. It is a product of her vision not only to make the broader community aware of the talents of musicians of African descent, but to make classical music more accessible, especially to people who, because of economic, social or other circumstances, may never have attended a classical music event, and to provide inspiration and role models for young musicians of all racial and ethnic backgrounds.

Ms. Hummings brought the festival to Rochester in 1995 after she joined the Eastman School of Music faculty. The school has been an active festival collaborator since then. Ms. Hummings was appointed in 1994 as Eastman's Distinguished Community Mentor.

The 2011 Gateways Music Festival marks the beginning of a new era in the festival's history. Long-retired as an associate professor of music at the Eastman School of Music, Ms. Hummings stepped down as president and artistic director of the Gateways Music Festival at the end of the 2009 season, positions she had held since the festival's beginning. She remains as festival advisor.

The vision Ms. Hummings brought to reality in founding the Gateways Music Festival is continuing through a new group she established within the Gateways organization: the Artistic Programs Committee. Headed by Lee Koonce, executive director of the Third Street Music School Settlement in New York City, the 21-member committee is composed of Eastman School of Music graduates. The Committee's primary role is to plan, develop and evaluate the music programming for each festival. It also has an active role in communicating with musicians.

Ms. Hummings has earned many honors and made many contributions to the world of music. During her second year at Juilliard, she won the piano competition, performing Schumann's Piano Concerto in A Minor with the Juilliard orchestra. The school honored her as one of 100 graduates to represent the accomplishments of Juilliard graduates when it celebrated its 100th anniversary. She won several national

and international piano competitions and appeared at the Spoleto Festival in Charleston, South Carolina, the Beethoven Festival in Carbondale, Illinois and the International Piano Festival at the University of Maryland as guest artist on the Great Peformer Series.

Her professional career includes concerts and recitals in the United States, including performances in New York City at Avery Fisher Hall, Alice Tully Hall, the Metropolitan Museum of Art and Town Hall. Her international performances cover 27 countries and five continents. Upon her return from a U.S. State Department tour overseas, she was honored at a State Department reception attended by then-Secretary of State Dean Rusk, in recognition of her contribution to international relationships.

She is the mother of four sons: Amadi, a professional violist; Gus, Jr., a Naval officer; and identical twins, Martin and Marcus, educator and psychologist respectively.

Gateways Music Festival, Inc. is an all-volunteer 501(c)(3) non-profit organization that presents a biennial classical music festival featuring solo recitals, chamber music, and orchestral and choral concerts in various community, church, school, and theatre locations in Rochester, New York. The Festival introduces classical music and "opens the gates" to all, including under-represented audiences, through our free performances. We have no paid staff and rely upon the Board of Directors to administer programs. Our Mission is threefold: (1) to increase the visibility of African-American classical musicians, (2) to provide networking opportunities for African-American musicians, and (3) to establish role models for young musicians. Participants in the Gateways Music Festival (GMF) include professional and student musicians from across the country.

PAUL J. BURGETT has a passion for music that embraces the roles of educator and scholar. He holds three degrees from the Eastman School of Music: bachelor's and master's degrees in violin and music education and a doctorate in music education. He currently serves the University of Rochester in several capacities: vice president and senior advisor to the president, university dean, adjunct professor of music in the university's College of Arts and Sciences and an academic advisor to freshmen and sophomores and advisor to several student organizations. As a UR faculty member, he teaches courses on the History of Jazz, the Music of Black Americans and music appreciation. His doctoral dissertation explored the aesthetics of the music of Black Americans. He is currently a member of the International Advisory Board of the Center for Black Music Research at Columbia College Chicago. He serves on the Board of Directors of the Gateways Music Festival, Inc. and the festival's Artistic Programs Committee.

Henri L. Muhammad, Founder & Executive Director





HENRI L. MUHAMMAD, a violinist and founder and executive director of the Muhammad School of Music in Buffalo, New York, performs regularly with the Gateways Music Festival Orchestra. Students from his school are also festival performers. Mr. Muhammad established his school in 1999 out of a desire to get more minority youth and

African Americans interested in classical music. The school began with 10 students. Now more than 100 students from throughout Western New York are involved in the school's instructional program in piano, cello, violin, string bass and viola. The MSOM String Ensemble has toured throughout New York State and performed in cities such as Washington, D. C., New York City, Los Angeles, Chicago and Detroit. The group also has appeared on television and radio programs. Mr. Muhammad holds a bachelor's degree in music from the University of Rochester and a master's degree in education from the State University of New York College at Buffalo. He has been a soloist with and a conductor of the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra and also performs regularly with the Harlem Symphony Orchestra and the Stradivari Society.





Seth Blumer Pianist

SETH BLUMER began playing the piano at the age of 5. He has grown as an artist and has won numerous awards and prizes including the Gold Prize in the 2010 Concerto Division of Young Pianist Competition of New Jersey. The 12-year-old already has performed in the Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall. He studies piano prviately with Svitlana Lukyanova Fiorito. He lives in Stamford, Connecticut and will be a seventh grader in the fall at Turn of River Middle School. At the Gateways Music Festival, he will play a solo at the Youth Showcase Concert and also with the chamber orchestra at the Chamber Music Concert.



Johnny Linton Violinist

JOHNNY LINTON began studying the violin at the age of seven. The 16-year-old has been a student at the Muhammad School of Music in Buffalo, New York since 2003. Johnny is a member of the school's Chamber Players, a touring ensemble. The group has performed with the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra. He also was a member of a special ensemble called the Stradivari Players, a select group that was chosen to perform at a special event with the Stradivari Society in May of this year. He lives in Buffalo and will be a senior in the fall at the Buffalo Academy for Visual and Performing Arts. At Gateways he will play two solo selections at the Youth Showcase Concert.



Kalen J. Winfrey

KALEN J. WINFREY began learning to play the piano at the age of six. Now, at the age of 17, he is an experienced classical pianist who has earned several awards. He placed second in the 2010 Bradshaw & Buono International Competition, and in 2009 he won second place in the American Protege International Piano Competition. For the past three years, he has been judged the overall winner and placed first in the classical instrumental category in the annual Talent Hunt competition sponsored by the Theta Omicron Chapter of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. in Rochester, NY. In April this year he was named overall winner in the fraternity's 62nd District Talent Hunt. As a result, he was to perform in the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity Centennial Celebration in July in Washington, D.C. He studies at the Eastman Community School under Joseph Irrera. A Rochester, New York resident, he will be a senior at Aquinas Institute in the fall. He will play two solo selections at the Youth Showcase Concert.

Jason Holmes Conductor

JASON HOLMES finds outlets for his love of music as a public school teacher, choral director and singer. A recent graduate of the Eastman School of Music, he holds a bachelor of music degree in music education and vocal performance. In 2006, he won first prize in the American Choral Directors Association's Undergraduate Student Conducting Competition. Besides being conductor of the Eastman Community School's Young Children's Choir, he also directs the choir at St. Mark's Episcopal Church in LeRoy and the University of Rochester Gospel Choir. He teaches vocal and general music at the French Road Elementary School in Brighton. He is currently pursuing a master's degree in music education from Ithaca College. He is a member of the Gateways Music Festival Artistic Programs Committee.



Scott Joplin Composer

SCOTT JOPLIN (1867-1917) was known as the "King of Ragtime" music. Born in Texas, he was proficient with the banjo as well as the piano. He also composed classical music. In 1911, he produced his first operatic work, "Treemonisha." It was the first grand opera ever written by an African American. Unfortunately, Joplin never got the recognition he deserved for his compositions until more than a half century after he died. In 1976, "Treemonisha" won the prestigious Pulitzer Prize.

Featured Works by African-American Composers



Michael Abels

MICHAEL ABELS (1962) has gained wide recognition as composer and arranger, particularly of orchestral pieces. Among the works by the Phoenix, Arizona navtive is "Dance for Martin's Dream." It was commissioned by the Houston Symphony and the Nashville Symphony. The Nashville orchestra premiered it in 1998 and it has been performed by many orchestras since. The work reflects the sad and happy feelings Abel experienced in dealing with the legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Abels' other orchestral works include "Global Warming" and "Variations on 'Swing Low Sweet Chariot'" for trumpet and orchestra.



Coleridge-Taylor Perkinson

COLERIDGE-TAYLOR PERKINSON (1932-2004) made significant contributions to the world of music as composer, conductor, pianist and arranger. His creativity ranged from symphonies to scores for television shows and movies, such as "A Warm December," starring Sidney Poitier. He performed concerts in Europe and played with drummer Max Roach's jazz group. A native of New York City, he was named for Samuel Coleridge-Taylor, a black composer and conductor who was prominent in the 1890s.



Herbert Smith

HERBERT SMITH (1969) plays third trumpet in the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra. But he is also at home being a teacher, a composer, a performer, a jazz group leader and a film scorer. A 1991 graduate of the Eastman School of Music, he is a trumpet teacher at the Eastman Community School. Some of his notable achievements include soloing with Wynton Marsalis (which can be seen on You Tube), composing film scores for African-American silent films from the 1910s and giving a classical recital at Carnegie Hall where his composition, "Twelve Tones of Christmas" was premiered. He composes inventive arrangements involving

a variety of musical styles for his jazz quintet, which sometimes is a quartet. He has composed a work for brass, entitled "Expansions of the Heart," which will be premiered at this year's Gateways Music Festival. Another of his brass compositions, entitled "Attitudes of Being," was priemiered at the 2009 festival. Mr. Smith plays regularly with the Gateways Music Festival Orchestra and is a member of the festival's Artistic Programs Committee.

Conductor

MICHAEL MORGAN returns to the Gateways Music Festival after a few years absence. He is music director of the Oakland East Bay Symphony in California, a position he has held since 1990. He also wears other directorial hats: artistic director of the Oakland Youth Orchestra. music director of the Sacramento Philharmonic and artistic director of the Festival Opera in Walnut Creek. In addition, he serves as artistic advisor to the Peoria Symphony in Illinois. Highly regarded as a champion of arts education and minority access to the arts, he was honored by the San Francisco Chapter of the Recording Academy with its Governor's Award for Community Service in 2005. That same year, the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers (ASCAP) chose him as one of five recipients of its Concert Award. He teaches the graduate conducting course at the San

Francisco Conservatory of Music. A product of the Oberlin College Conservatory of Music, he was chosen by Sir Georg Solti to become the assistant conductor of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra in 1986. He held that position for five years, under Solti and later Daniel Barenboim. Lenoard Bernstein invited him to debut with the New York Philharmonic in 1986. As guest conductor, Mr. Morgan has appeared with most of this country's major orchestras as well as the New York City Opera, the St. Louis Opera and the Washington National Opera.



Terrence Wilson **Pianist**

TERRENCE WILSON is recognized as one of today's most gifted classical pianists. He is soloist on an album by the Nashville Symphony, Giancarlo Guerrero conductor, that won the Grammy Award for Best Orchestral Performance earlier this year. Entitled Metropolis Symphony, the album is a live recording of the "Metropolis Symphony" and "Deus ex Machina for Piano and Orchestra," both composed by Michael Daugherty. Mr. Wilson had asked Mr. Daugherty to compose the piano work and assembled a consortium of five orchestras, including the Rochester Philharmonic, to cocommission the work. It premiered in 2007. Other awards and prizes he has won include the SONY ES Award for Music Excellence and the Juilliard Petschek Award. A graduate of The Juilliard School, he has been a soloist with

orchestras in the United States and abroad, including Rochester, Phildelphia, Atlanta, Switzerland, Malaysia and Brazil. He toured Sapin with the Baltimore Symphony. He has been featured on several radio and television programs including NPR's "Performance Today," and programs on the BRAVO and Arts and Entertainment Networks and public televsion. His world of music also encompasses the recital and chamber music arenas. Tanglewood and the Louvre in Paris are among some of the locales. He performs regularly with the Ritz Chamber Players.


